#### Ed and Dave Gather Grapes

Having just returned from a 1700-mile "pleasure" trip to South Carolina, which included several "adventures" related to my vehicle, I wasn't too excited about what was described as the Great Grape Gathering in Geneseo, NY. Fortunately, I agreed to accompany Dave Harding to this event sponsored by Chapter 86, the Society of Antique Modelers, SAM, from Ottawa, Canada. It was a blast and one of the most rewarding hobby –related activities in my experience.

The six-hour drive to the wine producing area of upstate New York was mostly turnpike cruising through gorgeous country with Dave having the fun of piloting his motor home.

On our arrival at the flying site, an immense level grass field, we parked next to a man who turned out to be the R/C event director, Mr. Roy Bourke. This too was fortuitous since Roy was what could be described at the "Compleat Modeler", and a great personality with much experience and knowledge in SAM and its competition events.

The second unexpected pleasure was the camaraderie of the Canadian competitors. Perhaps Dave will show a picture of the six wives who regularly appear and support the activities of SAM 86, attempting to set up the registration canopy. We never did determine who was in charge.




One very nice gesture is that the event "manager" is the widow of one of the club's former leaders. In this way she remains involved with the many friends she has worked with in the past. Most of the men were expatriated Brits, one of whom was a classmate and model club friend of Dave's going back 50 years in England. It was a great time for reminiscing and renewed friendship.

As for the flying events, there were both gas and rubber free flight and electric R/C. Dave was the big winner, claiming 3 1<sup>st</sup> place awards and I (flying Dave's spare plane, and utilizing his guidance and better eyesight) got a second and a third place awards. I should mention that I went with no planes to fly, courtesy of a tree at our field's border and lack of time to complete repairs. I must also state publicly that Dave provided coaching and timing and planes to allow me to participate in the competition. Flying conditions were fair with winds varying from 5–10 mph but landing on the field presented little problem.

The award presentation was unique, in that in addition to the plaques, with stick-on labels to specify the event and your placing, you were awarded a bottle of Canadian wine, your choice of red or white. Score – Harding 3, Goretzka 2 bottles.



Most of the competitors flew free flight events and although the field at Geneseo is ideal it still only took a couple of minutes to go outside the boundaries in the 10 mph wind. Of course, nowadays most of the competitors have motorcycles to aid in the chase. Geneseo is also the site for the biannual FAC (Flying Aces Club) Nats., a freeflight competition mostly for rubber powered scale models.



The Saturday night BBQ was held in a hanger that housed several historic aircraft. Several piper and Aeronca WW II liaison planes (fully restored), a USN AD-5 Skyraider and a Russian Antanov AN-02 biplane (both of which I had never seen before) were a great backdrop. In addition, two beautifully restored SNJ's appeared, they are regularly flown for sightseeing. The ultimate was the arrival of another restored antique, a Stearman PT-17 bipe, which just happened to land that evening. The owner was spending the summer flying around the US visiting friends and attending various aviation meets and fly-ins. Most nights he sleeps under a wing but does check into a motel if necessary! What a way to live!! He gratefully accepted our offer of a cold beer.

Sunday morning we departed and as an added bonus we took a short detour to visit the Glenn H Curtis museum at Hammondsport NY. You may know him as one of the earliest pioneers in the aircraft field, but he also was originally a motorcyclist and manufacturer of bicycles and motorcycles. Numerous examples were on display as well as his Curtis Jennie of WW I fame, a training plane for thousands of pilots in the early '20's.

To sum up, boy, am I glad I went!

Creative flight profiles were required to shake this sucker loose, but it worked if you could figure it out! Some did!







The "competitive events were divided into three separate pieces, although points were awarded for each and the "grand champion" was the high score from the total.

The first event involved taxiing around some flags, then "dropping" a "bomb" on a target followed by six loops and six spins and a precision landing, all within a specific time. The gas powered aerobats ruled here, but it was more difficult than it seemed.

The second event was a balloon burst followed by three limbo passes under a line and a precision landing. In a rare calm moment Dave Harding elected to enter with his Lite Stick. Much to everyone's astonishment, most of all Dave's, the three balloons succumbed immediately and one limbo pass was followed by a "hovering" landing into the rapidly increasing wind, within two feet of the line.

Keith Watson tried with his Mini IFO, a brave gesture in the wind. A quick kill of the balloon was followed by a limbo into the line, which wrapped itself around his prop shaft until the motor stopped. The limbo line was replaced by a tape.

Mike Black was next up with his aerobat. Following unsuccessful passes on the Balloon Mike destroyed his model when his limbo pass strayed into the far post. The next victim was John Zebuski who flew his aerobat into the new tape, wrapping it around his prop until his motor stopped ending his attempt.

The smoothest of the gas entrants, all of whom were handicapped by the necessary high flying speeds, was Mark Berkemeyer flying his large trainer. Mark cleverly placed himself at the extreme end of the pilot area so he could fly his model straight towards himself and under the limbo tape. He had an excellent view of both posts and the tape enabling him to fly a smooth path through the gates followed by a steep turn back away from the pits. His three successive limbo passes were impressive.

The final two events were limited motor run duration contests for electric powered airplanes, the first for speed 400 power the second for larger motors. Keith Watson won the first and Keith and Bob Crowell tied for the win in the second.

The event organizer Mickey Callahan was not done yet as in addition to the organizing the contests he acquired a number of prizes for all the competitors and arranged a raffle for a GWS Spitfire ARF, donated by Hobby Town of Springfield. As luck would have it, Dave Harding won both the competition and the raffle! Thanks Mickey.


What were the rest of the members doing while all this was going on? Well, it seems that it was so entertaining that they were content to watch. Flying could wait until it was over.
